- 2. Indifference is easily excused; that's why many denominations have given up on Sunday evening services.

II. POST-PENTECOST

- A. Peter and John Spread the Word (Acts 3f).
- B. Cornelius And His Family (Acts 10).
- C. Oh, that each member of the Lord's body shared this same excited today, and every day.

III. OUR GOSPEL MEETING.

- A. Preparation.
 - 1. Advertising
 - 2. Preparing our Hearts
 - a. Local members must see the need and want to participate.
 - b. Must come to understand/appreciate the value of a soul (Mt. 16:26).
 - c. Personal evangelism must be stressed—Phillip (Acts 8)
 - d. A Gospel meeting lives or dies with the enthusiasm and participation of the sponsoring congregation (Acts 10:33).

 - b. Reprove (convict, proof, evidence; emp. sin-consciousness
 - c. Rebuke (correct, straightening up again)
 - d. Exhort (console, comfort, encourage)

D. Prayer

- 1. Let us pray for ourselves.
- 2. Pray for the lost (cf. Rom. 10:1).
- 3. Pray for the church; that we will seek the lost that they might be saved.
- 4. Pray for our brother who will speak to us.

E. Possibilities

- 1. God encouraged Paul at Corinth (cf. Acts 18:9-10).
- 2. Every time we speak of Christ/Gospel, there are possibilities.
- 3. What we say and how we live.

F. Patience

- 1. Always be hopeful.
- 2. Always be expectant (Rom. 1:16).
- 3. Never become discouraged! Like seed that is sown, sometimes the Gospel takes time to germinate (Isa. 55:11).

G. Pew-Packers

- 1. We need YOU here. How can we expect to influence people regarding their souls, if we are unconcerned with our own?
- 2. What do we teach the youngsters when we often intentionally skip services for any number of lesser important things?

CONCLUSION:

- 1. We have the promise of Heaven: "I am with thee" (Mt. 18:20).
- 2. We have the encouragement of brother Paul: I can do all things through Christ who strengthened me (Phlp. 4:13).
- 3. Let us live as interested, devoted disciples of Christ, that one day we may hear, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant"

SPEAKING WHAT MUST BE HEARD Neal Pollard

In World War I, German intelligence was able to steal American plans at will. Tapping enemy lines was extremely easy, especially at night. Faced with such a dilemma, a regiment full of Choctaw Indians thought of a potential solution. The commander inquired into how many Choctaws knew their mother tongue. The men hesitated. The first English word some of them had learned was "soap." In basic training, they were threatened with having their mouths washed out if caught speaking their native language. Now, their regimental leaders wanted them to speak it

The Choctaws were dispersed among the various divisions and attached to communications. From that point to the end of the war, all important orders were passed along in Choctaw. The Germans were stymied and finally caught off guard by the Americans' war plans (from PBS' American Experience: The Great War, Episode 3).

Today, our society does not want to hear us speak the message of Christ. Many find it offensive and restricting. They may even put great pressure on us to keep quiet. But, we cannot. These have been taken captive by the devil to do his will (2 Tim. 2:26). Especially when someone sees the spiritual crisis in his or her life, there will be a desperate desire for an answer. Where will they turn? If they have heard us speak of Christ and His way, they may need us to communicate the most important message ever spoken. Don't keep quiet about Jesus, especially given the dire danger in this spiritual warfare (2 Cor. 10:3-5). God is counting on us to speak for Him, and so is a lost and dying world! Keep sharing Him.
